Parts of the Sentence - Verbals - Noun Infinitives

An *infinitive* is a *verbal* that is *to* plus a *verb form*. It can be used as a *noun*.

Examples:

to be, to see, to be seen, to be eaten

The noun infinitive can be a subject, a direct object, a predicate nominative, an appositive, or an object of a preposition.

Examples:

To eat is fun. (subject)

I like *to eat*. (direct object)

A fun thing is *to eat*. (predicate nominative)

My hope, *to travel*, never happened. (appositive)

I want nothing but to save. (object of preposition)
